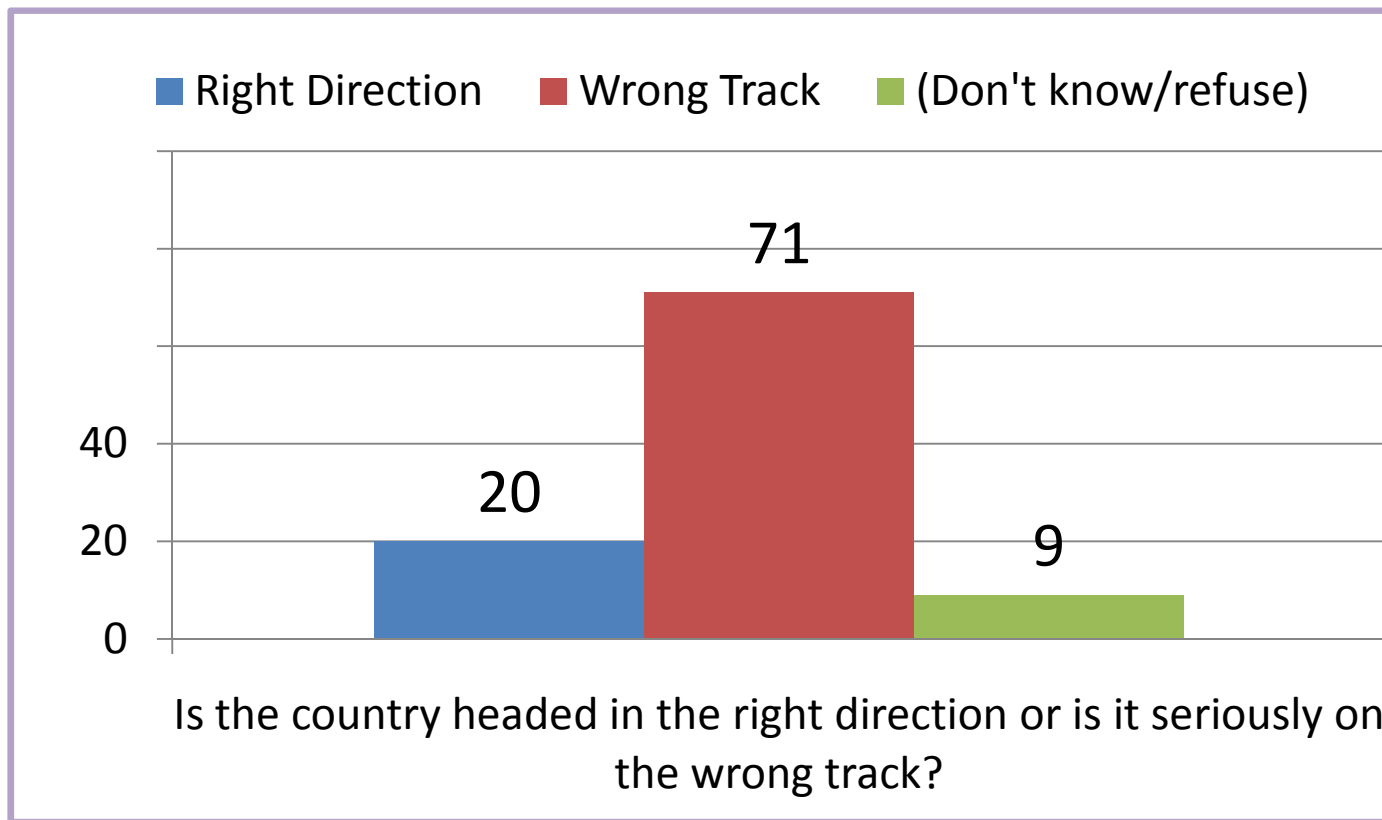

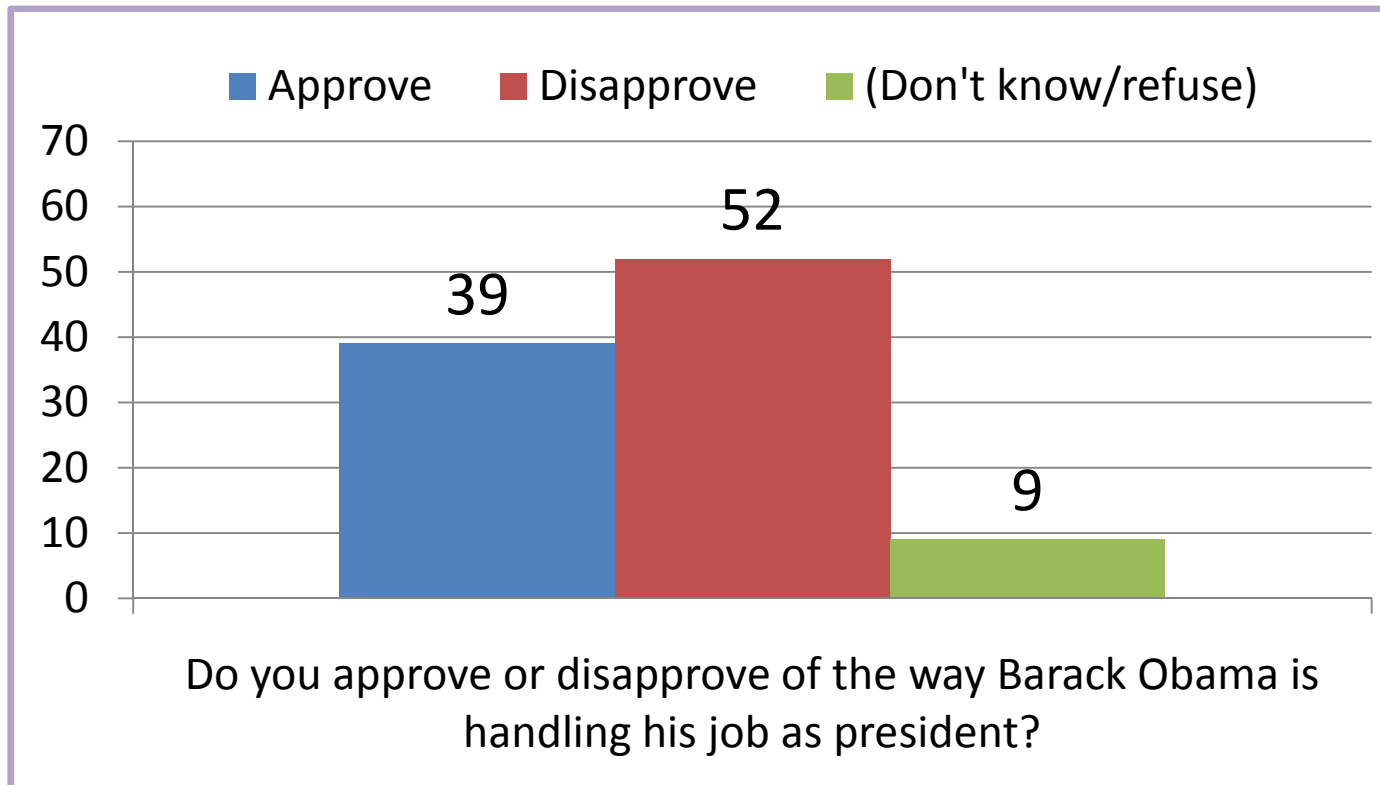
METHODOLOGY

- 351 adults (age 18 and older) in North Carolina
- The survey was conducted October 9 - 14
- The sample is weighted to Census estimates of demographics of North Carolina's population
- Estimated margin of sampling error is plus or minus 5.3 percent

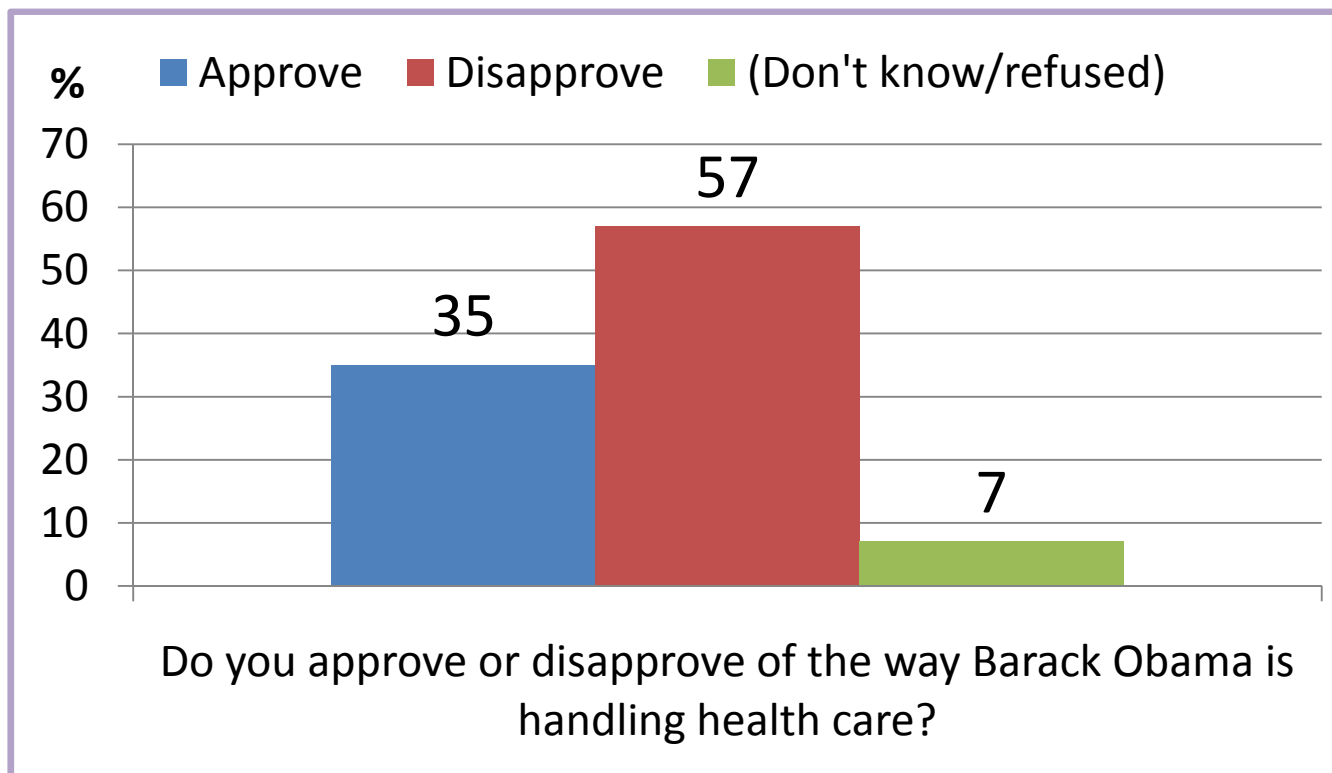
LARGE MAJORITY SAYS COUNTRY IS ON THE WRONG TRACK



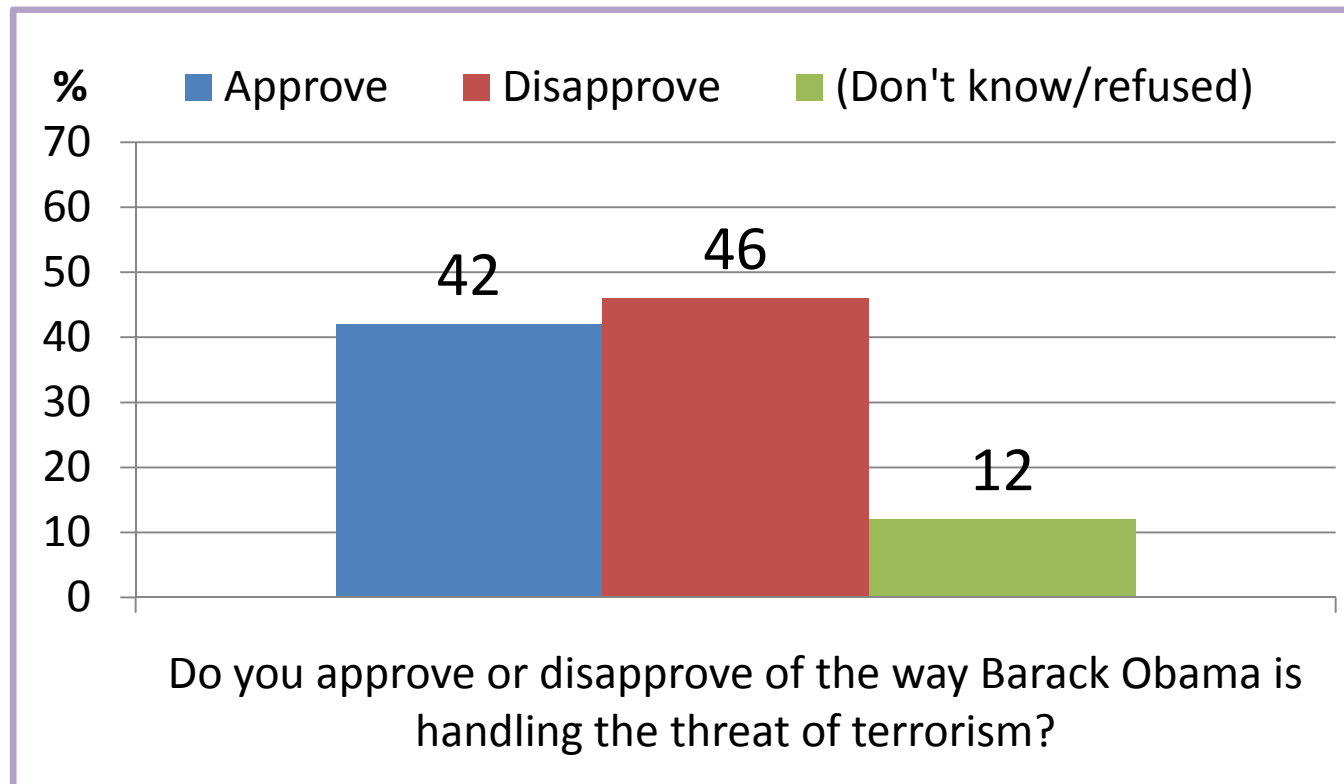
MAJORITY OF NORTH CAROLINIANS DISAPPROVE OF HOW PRESIDENT OBAMA IS HANDLING HIS JOB



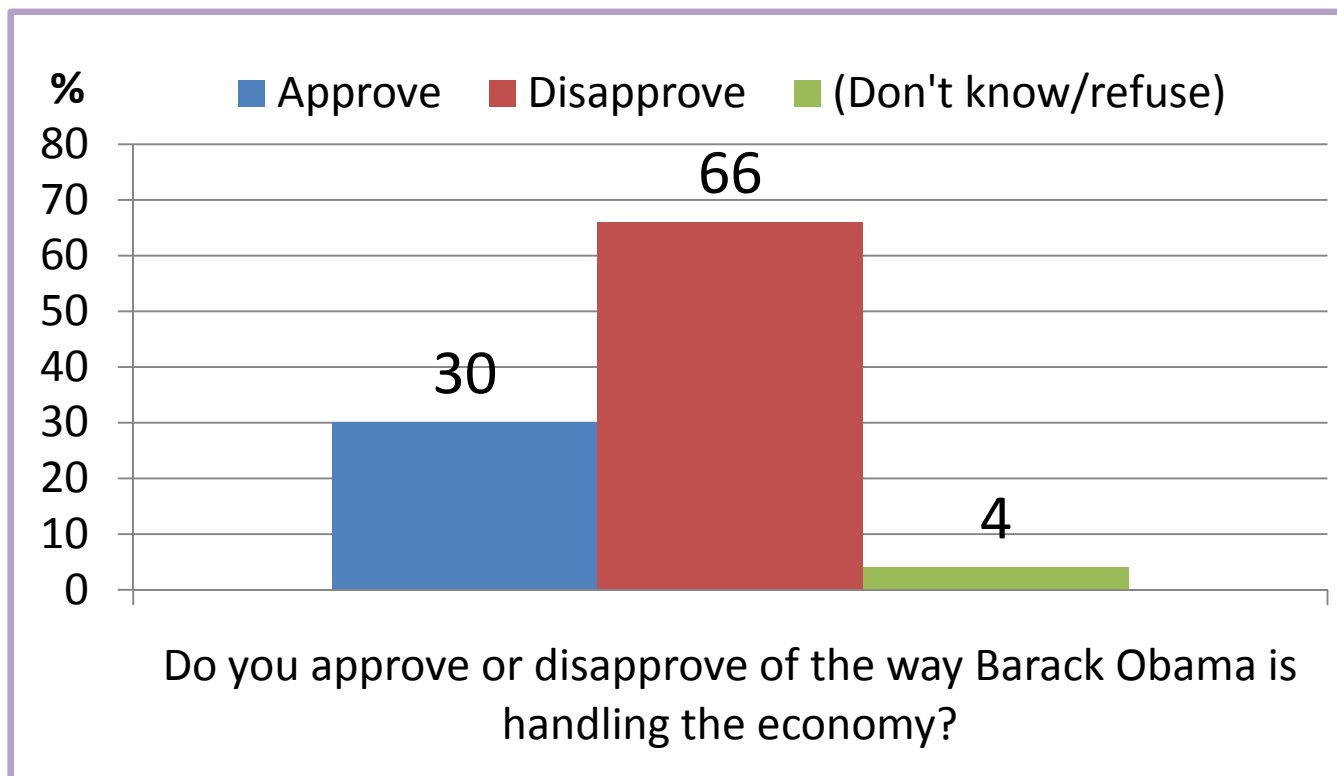
MAJORITY IN NC DISAPPROVES OF PRESIDENT OBAMA'S HANDLING OF HEALTH CARE



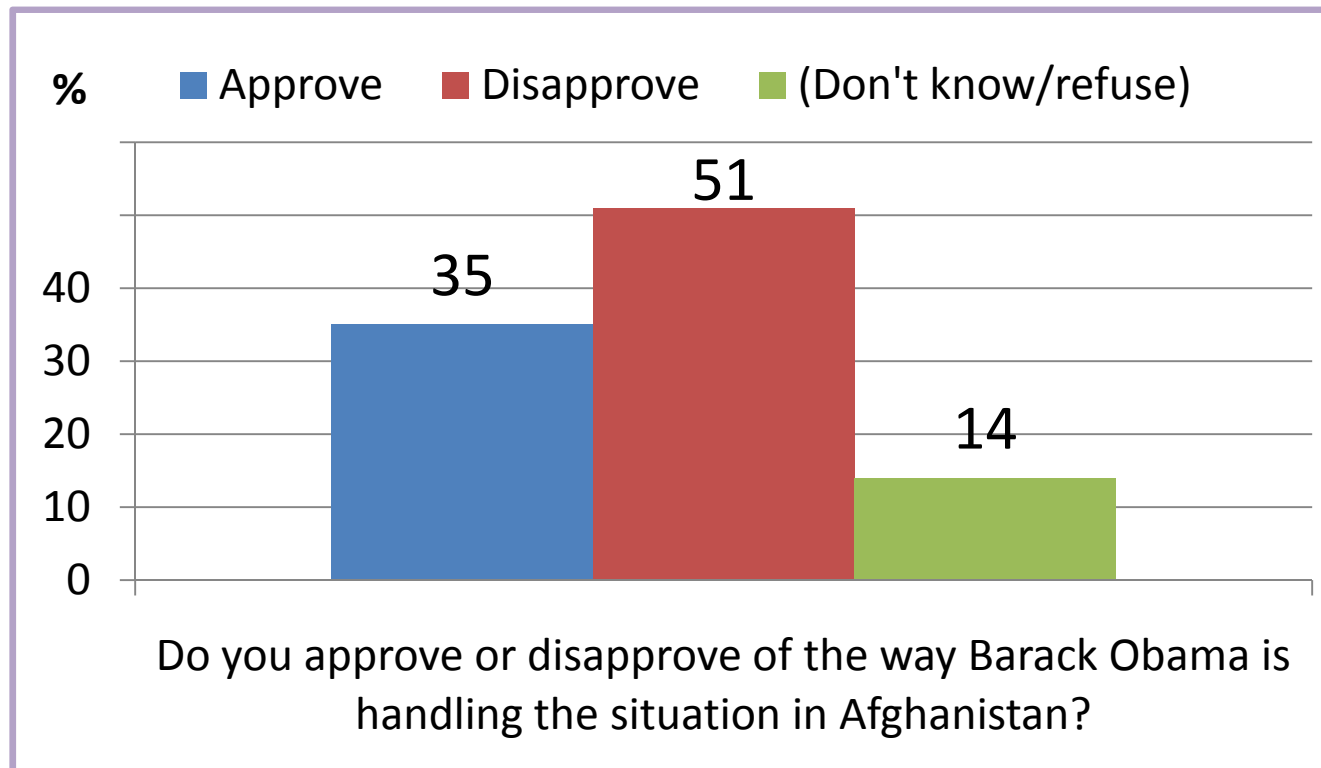
PLURALITY IN NC NOW DISAPPROVES OF PRESIDENT OBAMA'S HANDLING OF THE THREAT OF TERRORISM



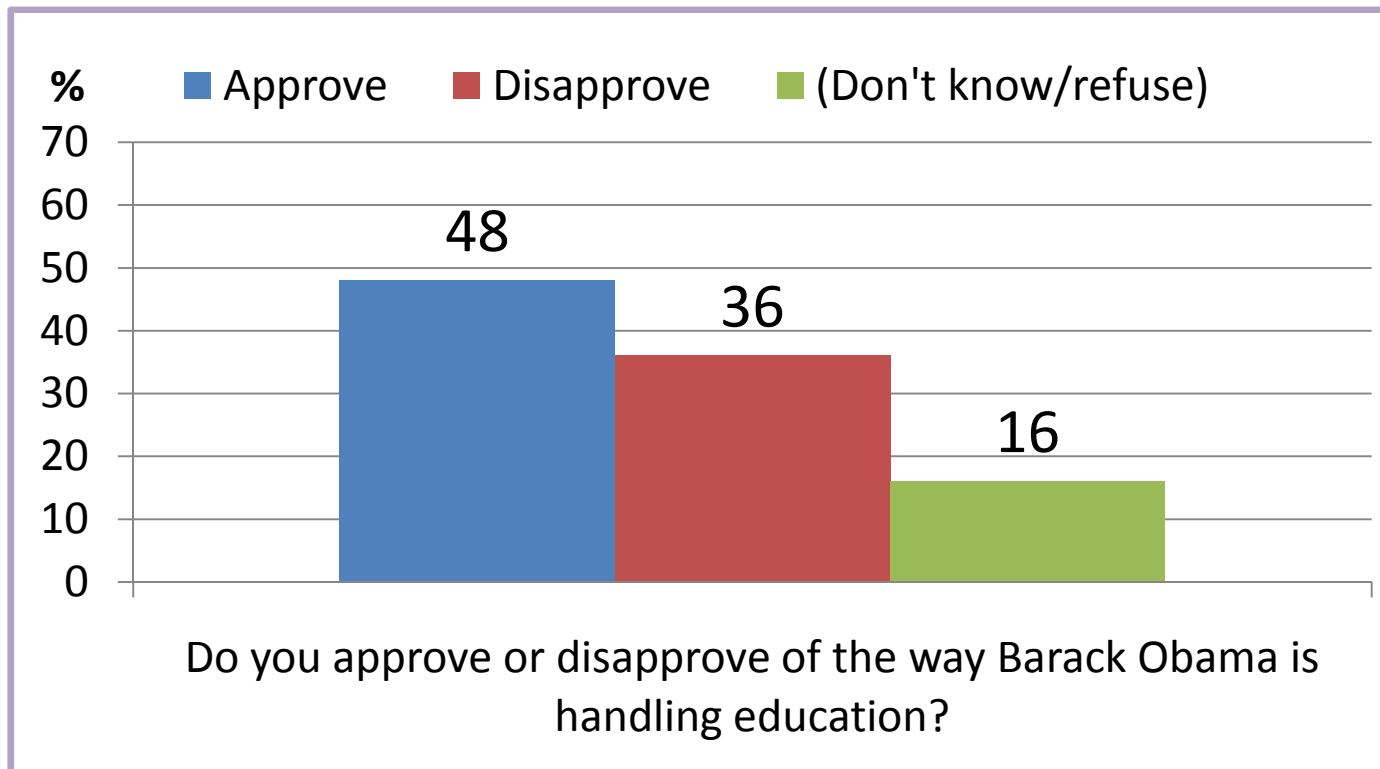
MAJORITY IN NC DISAPPROVES OF PRESIDENT OBAMA'S HANDLING OF THE ECONOMY



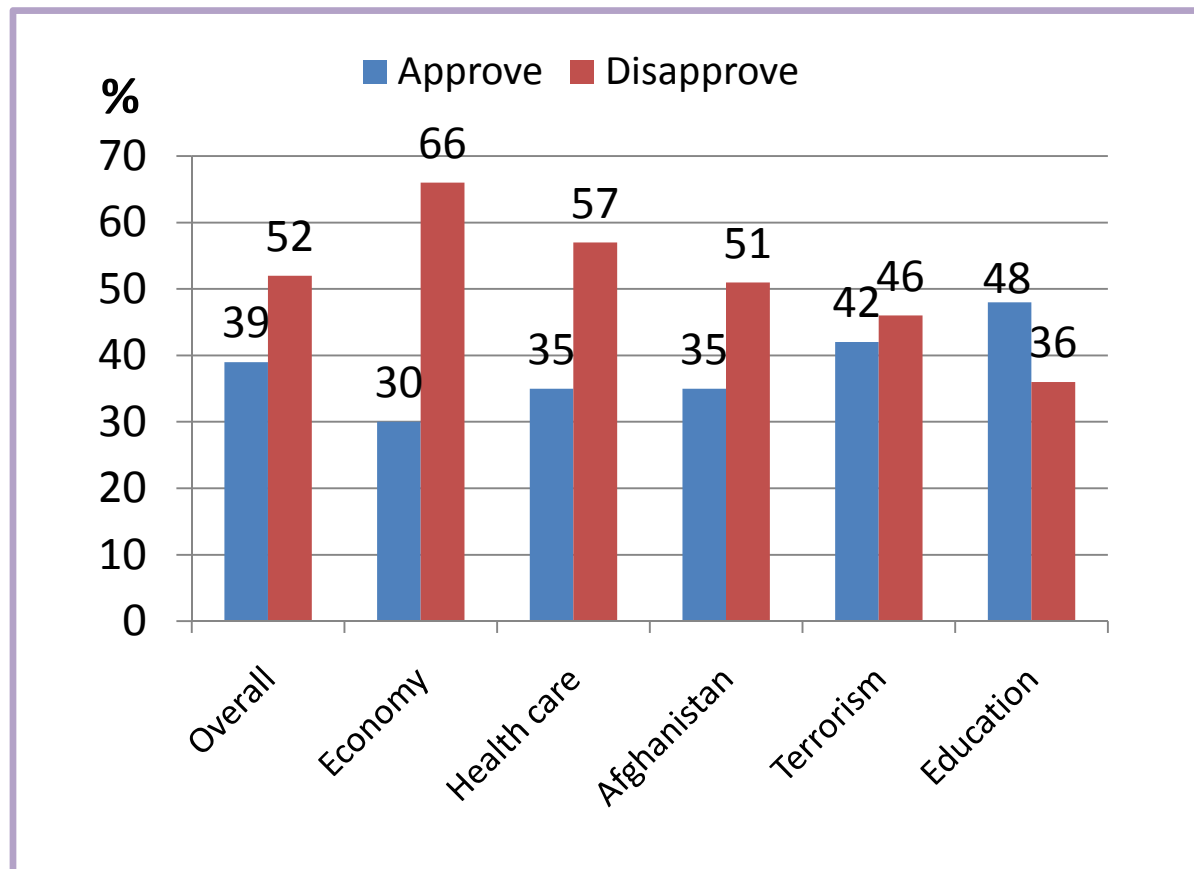

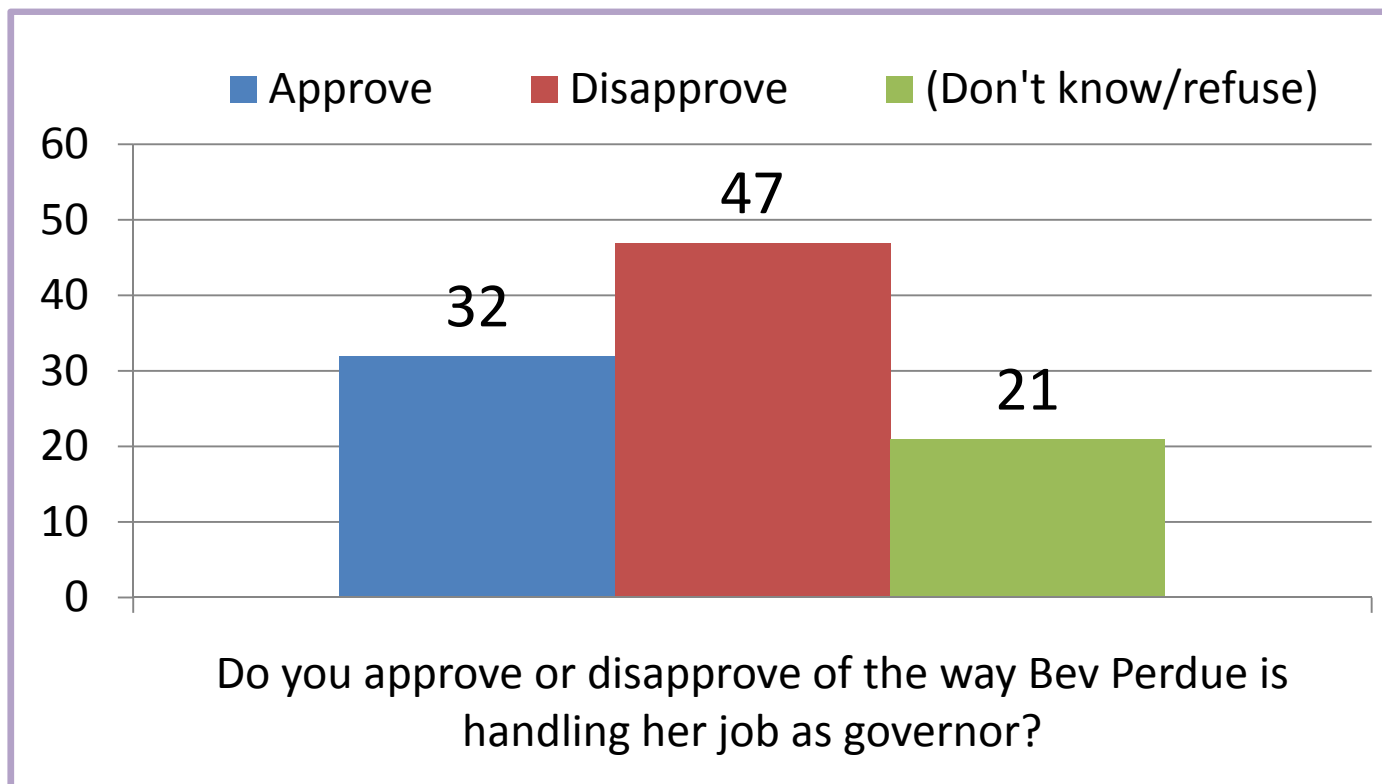
PLURALITY IN NC STILL APPROVES OF PRESIDENT OBAMA'S HANDLING OF EDUCATION



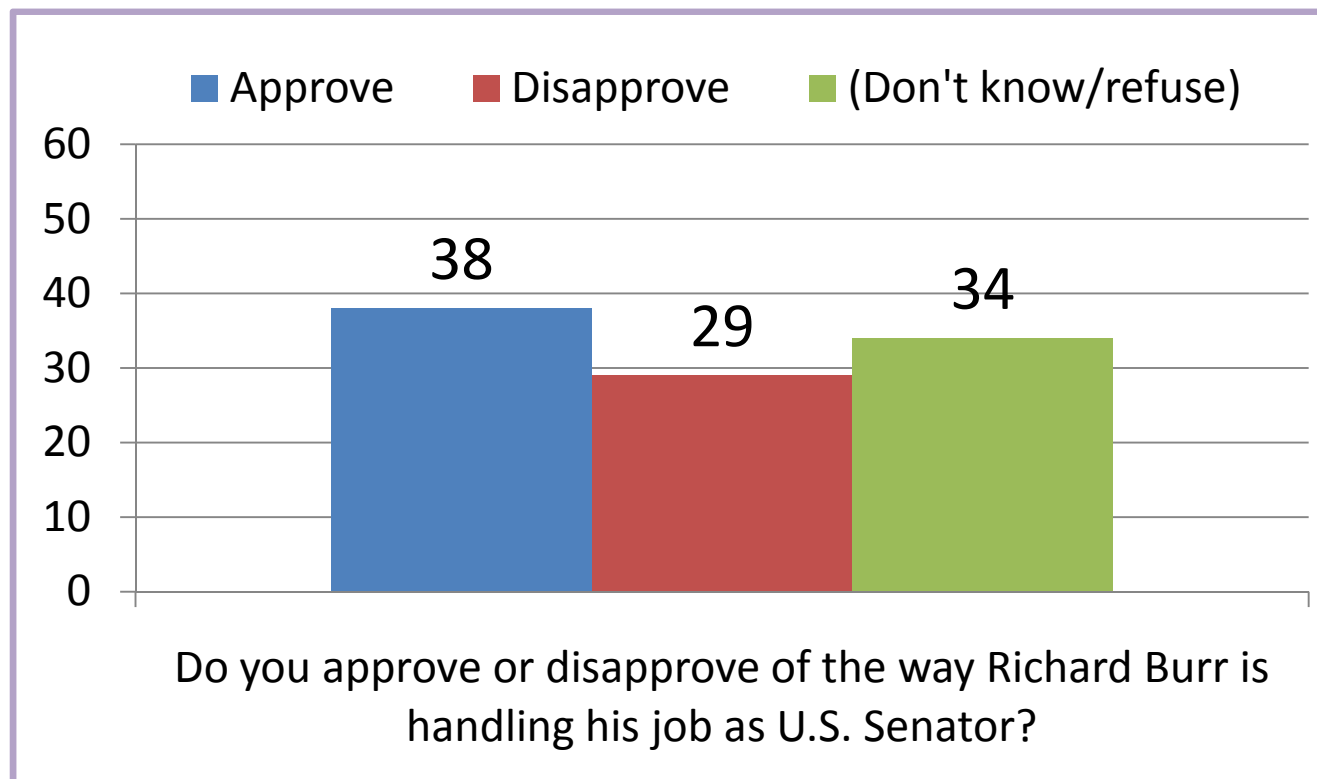
OBAMA APPROVAL VARIES ACROSS ISSUES



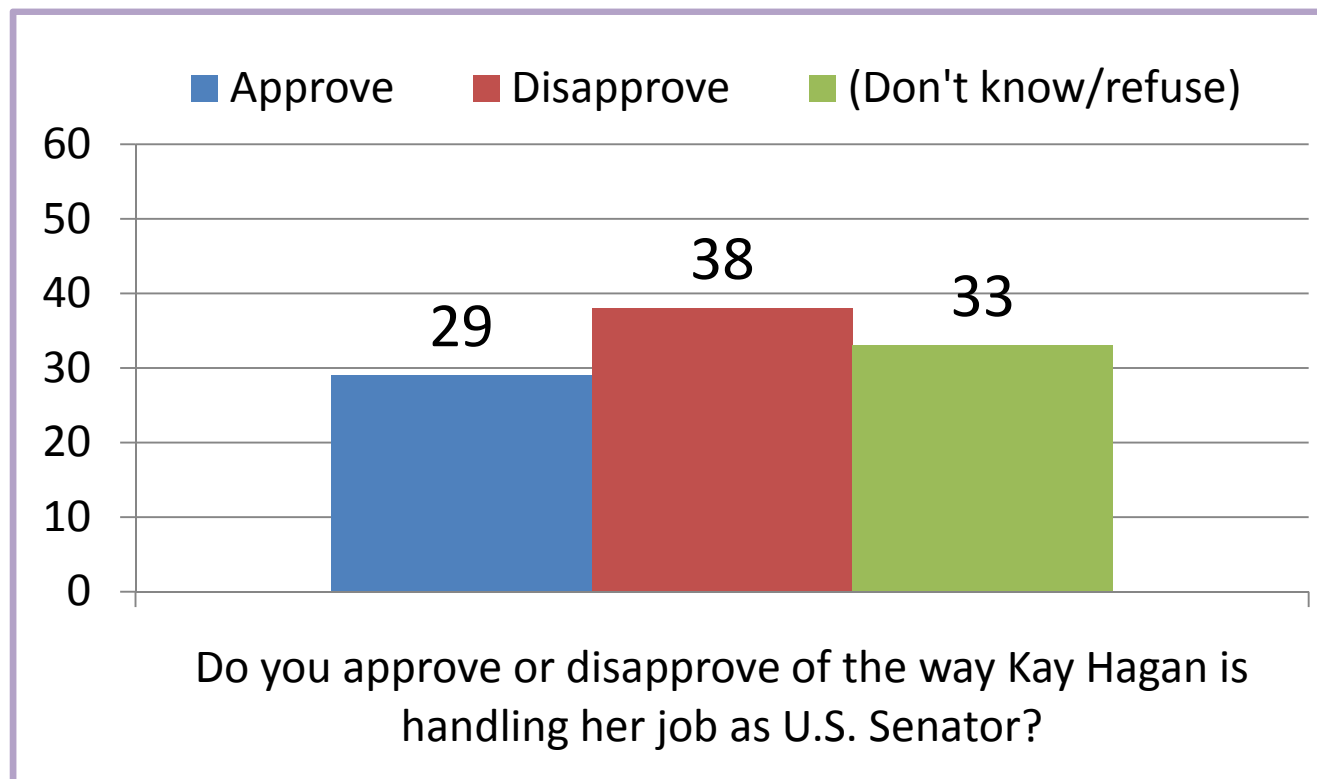

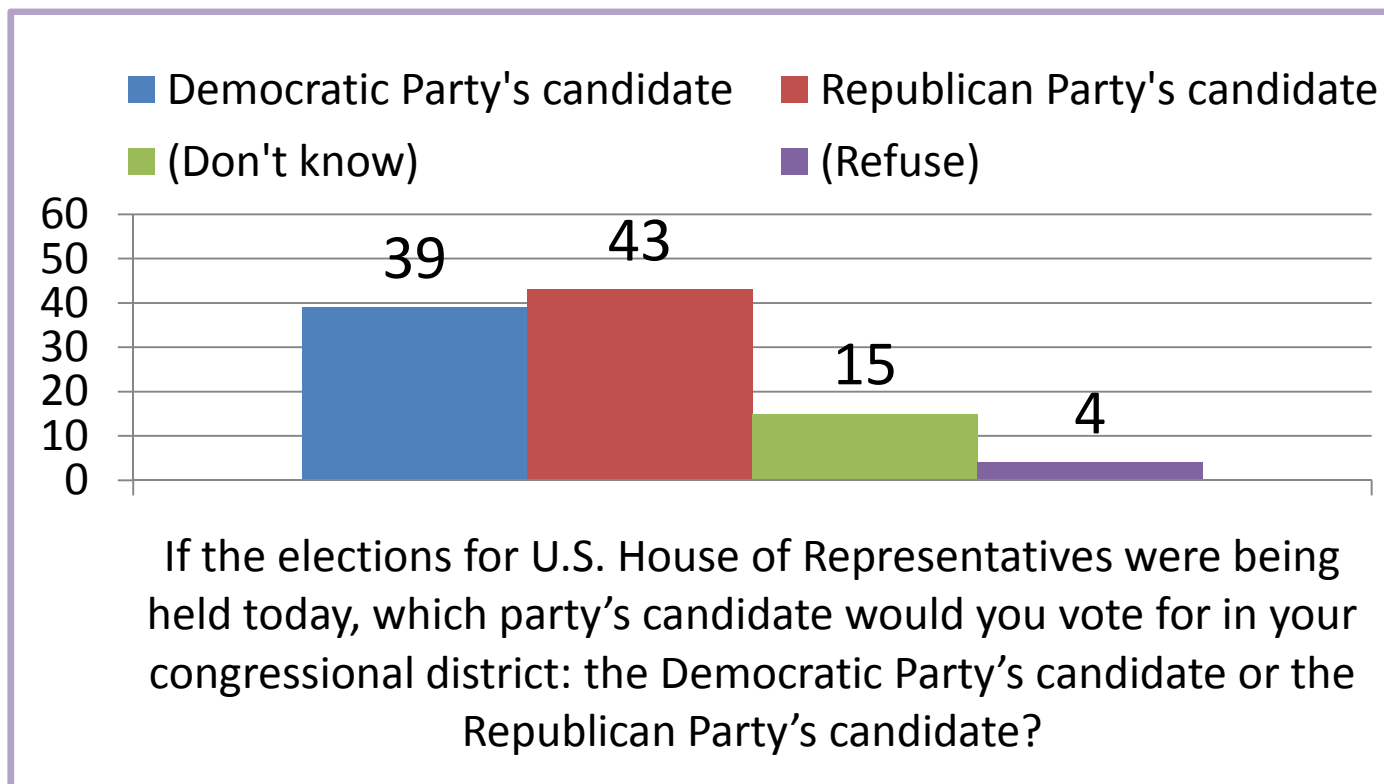
A PLURALITY IN NC APPROVE OF HOW SENATOR BURR IS HANDLING HIS JOB



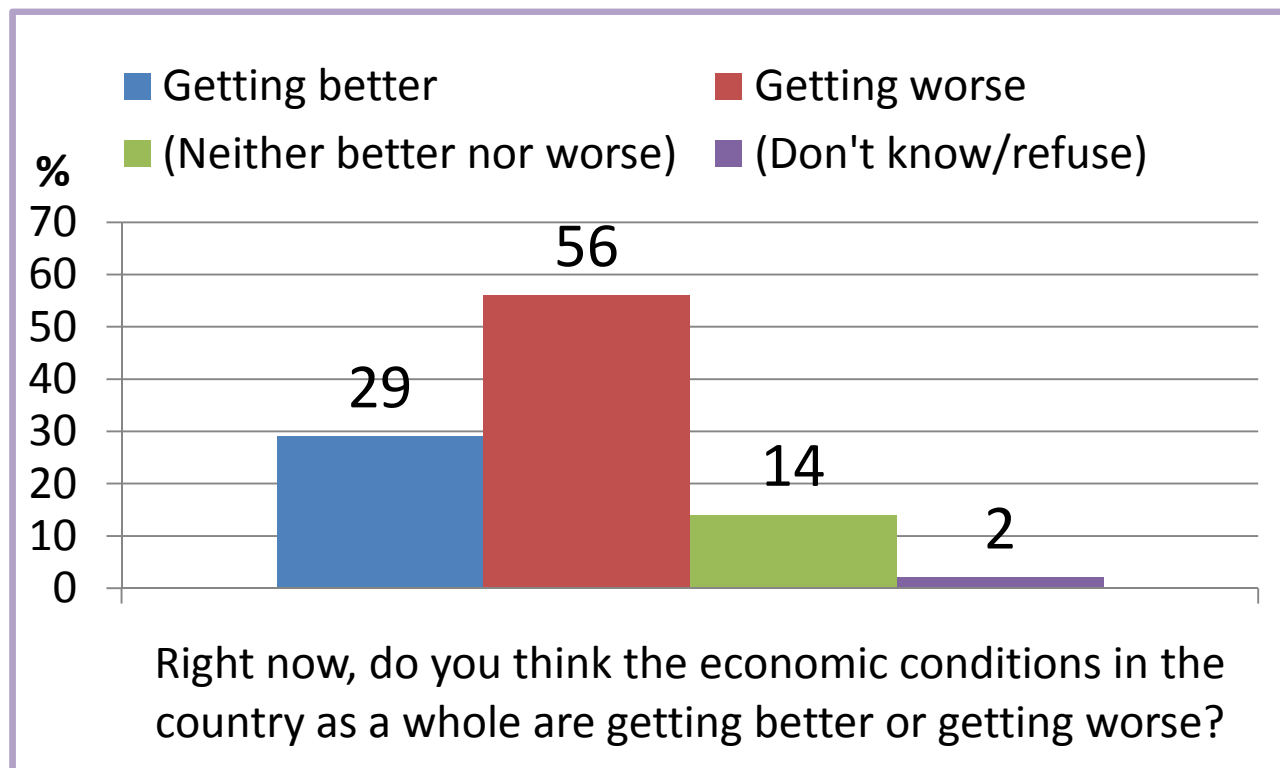
A PLURALITY IN NC DISAPPROVE OF HOW SENATOR HAGAN IS HANDLING HER JOB



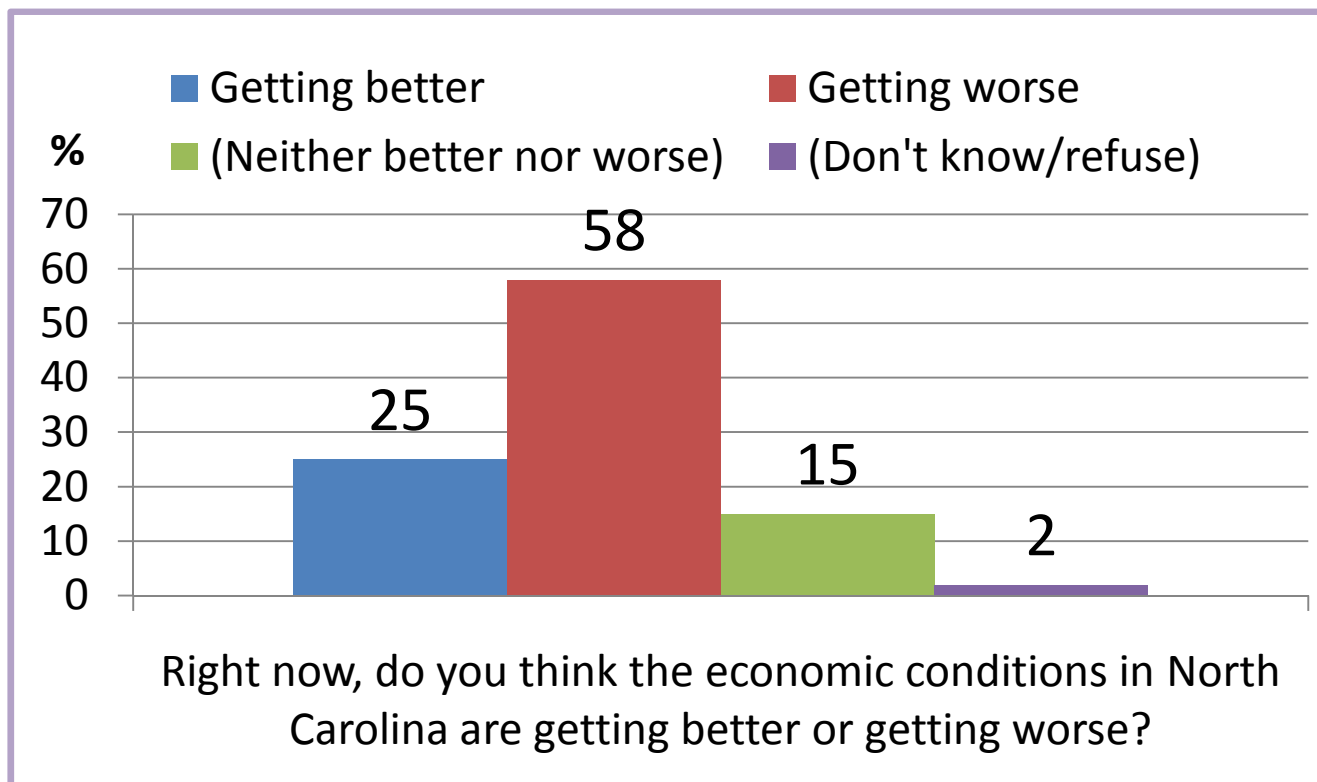
PLURALITY IN NC CHOOSE REPUBLICAN PARTY CANDIDATES FOR U.S. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES



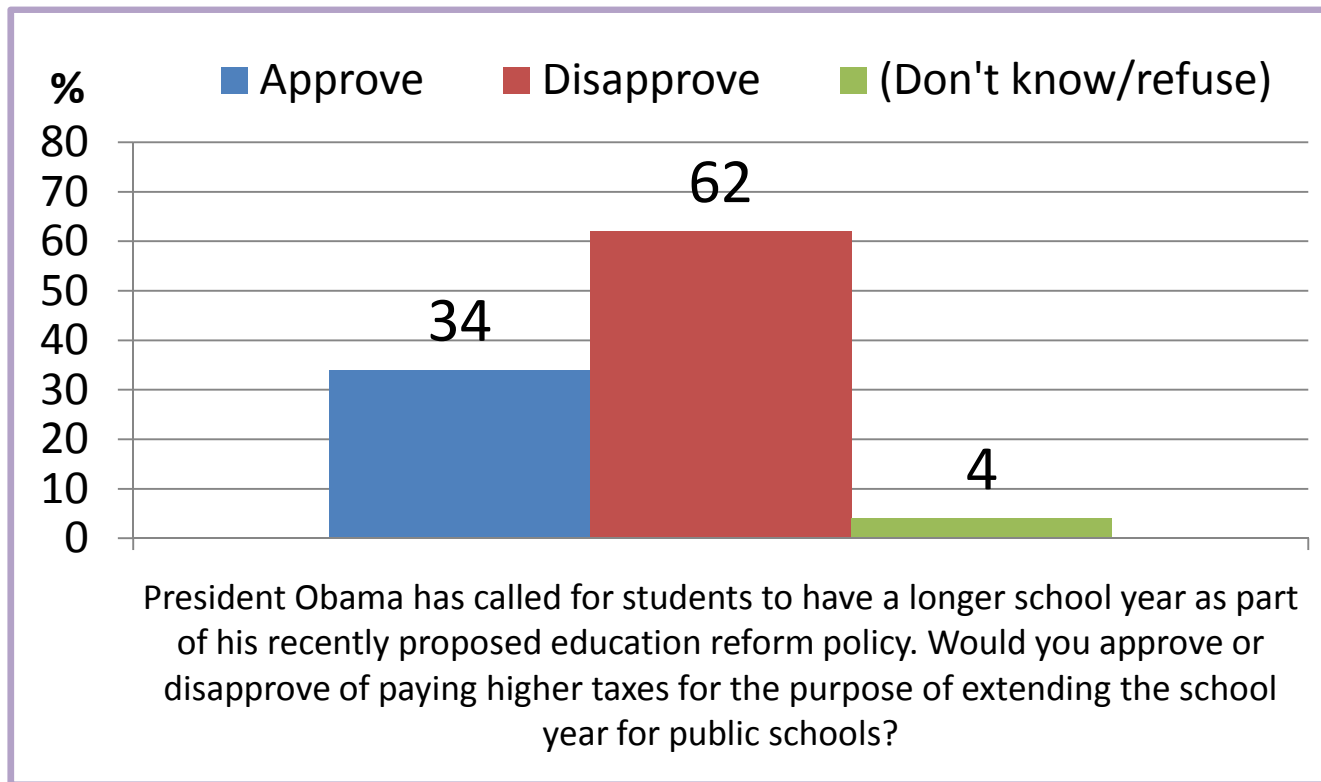
MAJORITY IN NC SAYS ECONOMIC CONDITIONS IN COUNTRY ARE GETTING WORSE



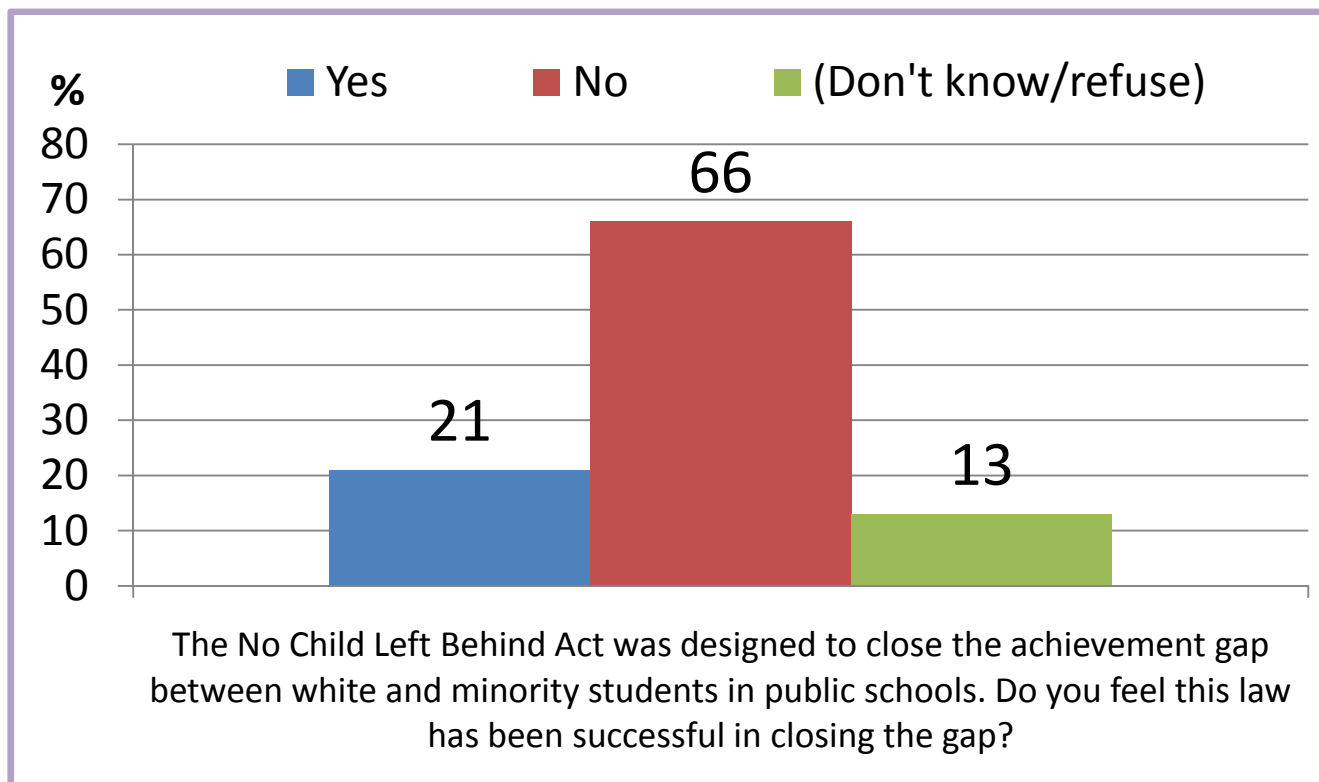

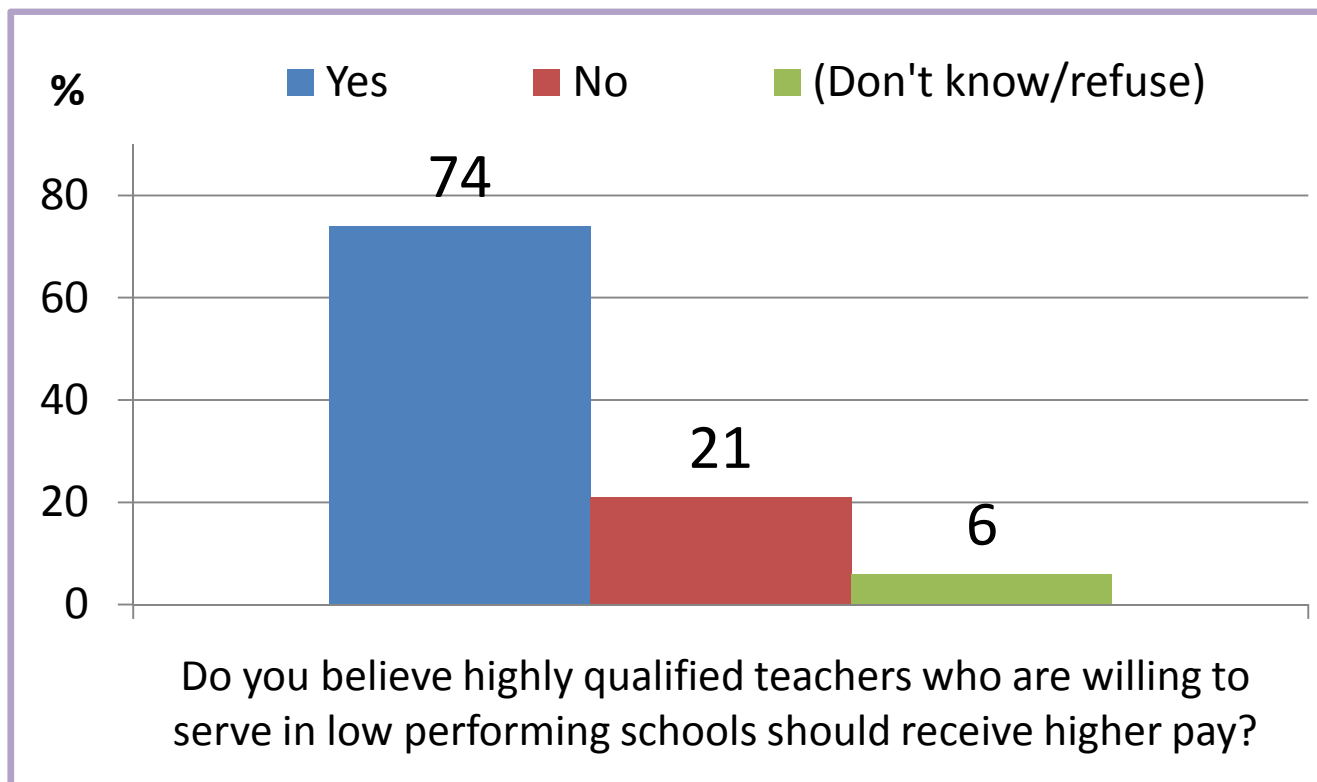
MAJORITY SAYS THEY WOULD NOT PAY MORE TAXES TO EXTEND THE PUBLIC SCHOOL YEAR



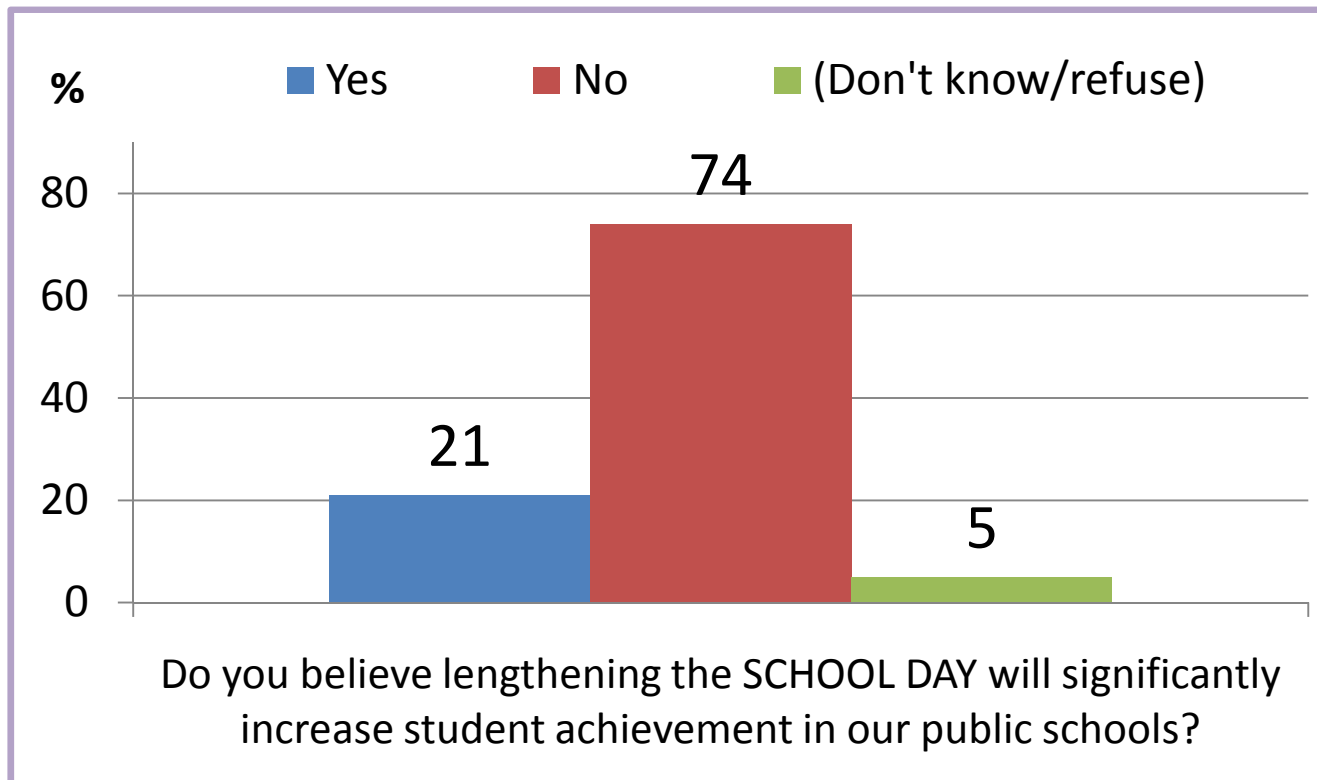
MAJORITY SAYS “NO CHILD LEFT BEHIND” HAS NOT CLOSED ACHIEVEMENT GAP
