Applications are now being accepted for the Scholarly Interdisciplinary Research Grant! The award is up to \$1000 and can be used for research or creative works supplies and/or travel for fieldwork. Those projects that best articulate the interdisciplinary nature of the work will be given preference.

Applications are due April 1st

The recipient will be awarded this grant at High-PURCS. Funds will be made available for use starting in June of the same year and throughout the next academic year.
