This course traces the historical path of classical antiquity from the medieval period until its recovery and advancements during the Italian Renaissance. Students will analyze the factors that caused the Renaissance and examine the immediate and long-term impact of the Renaissance phenomenon on societies, politics, art, culture, and ideas throughout Europe. Prerequisite: One 1000 – or 2000-level history course or permission of the instructor. Four Credits.
